

G-20 human rights violations!

Support calls for an independent inquiry into police action during the G20 Summit in Toronto. There have been numerous reports of human and civil rights violations during community actions during the G20 week.

Peaceful protesters have been harassed. Women have reported being strip searched by male police officers, threatened with sexual assault and experiencing other sexist, racist and homophobic behaviour and comments from police in the make-shift detention centre where hundreds of detainees were held without charge.

To express opposition to decisions and actions that took place during the Summit week, you can:

- Write a letter to decision-makers on your own behalf, or on the behalf of a group or organization, to support the call for an independent inquiry.
