




Victim & Perpetrator Age Comparision




Victim Race

Media's Role in Femicide Prevention

In August, four femicides were confirmed in the province. One previously unconfirmed case has been newly confirmed following the publication of additional police disclosure pertaining to the victim's identity. Since November 26, 2024, 31 femicides have been confirmed in the province. In these femicide cases, family members (32.2%) and intimate partners (29.1%) are most commonly charged and/or deemed responsible for the victim's death. In 12.9% of cases, the victim and accused were reported to have known each other. In five cases (16.1%), the relationship between the victim and suspected perpetrator has not been disclosed and in three cases (9.7%), media reports have indicated that there was no prior relationship between the accused and victim.

Media plays an important role in femicide awareness and prevention, as the framing of these incidents can inform and shape public discourse, either perpetuating individualizing and sensationalized narratives or situating femicide within broader patterns of gender-based violence. As a part of OAITH's research on femicide, an annual media analysis is conducted tracking key frames and assessing media reporting on femicide in the province. Over the last few years, a notable shift in media reporting has been seen in which these killings are labelled as femicide or less explicitly as gender-related killings. By labelling these deaths as femicides, the general public can better contextualize these deaths as connected and a part of larger gendered social issues. As such, it is easier to see the magnitude of the issue, as opposed to viewing these deaths as isolated or random killings. Despite this shift, there is more that the media can do to enhance public awareness and understanding of femicide. For example, the inclusion of voices of community based advocates with GBV expertise and providing help information for survivors can help to strengthen media reporting on femicide and improve community safety. Given the far reach of media and its ability to frame and contextualize social issues like femicide, journalists have a role to play in femicide prevention.
